Marriage may not mean the same thing to other people as it means to me. But what I do

withhold this very same choice to the people in same-sex relationships, by the fact that we

are not equal and that others are discriminated in such shameful manner. Although I have

preferences as I do.

As an atheist, I also feel that my religious freedom is violated by a religious-driven agenda to

restrict marriages to opposite-sex couples. Those are not my religions. My freedom of religion

is restricted by the fact that we continue to pass laws based on these agenda.

Please let the couples decide for themselves what their marriages mean to them and not by

some people's misguided prejudice and sense of unfairness.
