Travaston Crossing Dam Senate Enquiry
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To Whom It May Concern

We are the owner operators of a 280 acre dairy farm which is situated to the north of Gympie and the dam site.

As owners of a 100 megalitre water licence which allows us to pump from the Mary River (sourced from Borumba Dam), we have grave concerns about our continuity of water supply for irrigation purposes. Given that there is an increasing demand on the amount of water that is stored at Borumba, we are fully aware that a water storage facility in the Mary Valley area is an absolute necessity. However, it is our view, and indeed the view of many people in the area, that the proposed site at Traveston Crossing is highly unsuitable for this type of facility.

The Mary Valley has alluvial soil which has been washed down from the mountains over many years. This soil is a porous type soil that is many metres deep. There are a myriad of known and unknown underground streams that run through the valley in various directions. It is our view that with a considerable weight of water placed at the proposed Traveston Crossing site, it would not take long for the water to seep through into these underground streams and virtually siphon out into the unknown.

Having lived and worked in the Mary Valley for a good number of years and seen many floods and the effects of them, we would very much doubt that a dam structure at the site proposed by the State Government could successfully achieve the purpose that they are attempting to do.

We believe that the proposal put forward to the State Government by Mr Ron McMah of increasing the capacity of the existing Borumba Dam is the only proposal that the State Government should be considering for the following reasons:

- We understand the State Government already owns the land that would be inundated in the event of increasing the capacity of Borumba Dam. [The State Premier has already toured this alternative site with Mr McMah].
- There would be no encroachment into people's lives.
- There would be no need to purchase additional land, as the State Government is in the process of doing for the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam.
- There would no trauma or torment to residents in the Mary Valley.
- There would be no need to rebuild existing infrastructure i.e. roads, rail lines, electricity lines, power sub stations and schools.
- It would pose a far less number of concerns on environmental issues.
- The dairy industry has been a large part of the Mary Valley's history. There are a number of sites, both known and unknown, where arsenic concentrate cattle tick sprays and dips have been used. We now know the dangers of using this particular chemical. To knowingly use the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam site for water storage, that is contaminated in this way, especially in today's enlightened society, would be criminally negligent.

The Mary Valley has a distinctive natural beauty all of its own, from rugged mountain bluffs and rain forest, to rolling green pastures. It is a highly productive area.

At its fullest it is said that the proposed Traveston Crossing dam would only have an average depth of about 5 metres. This is without taking into account the high level of evaporation typical of a large body of shallow water and also seepage associated with being built in a valley of alluvial soil type.

In view of these facts it would be a shameful indictment in this day and age, if we were to ruin the Mary Valley, creating a stinking, boggy expanse of mud flats dotted with shallow ponds of mosquito infested stagnant water. It would turn the area into a place where no one would want to visit.

Over the last 12 months, the area's major newspaper has done an excellent job of keeping us informed with the latest developments on the issues concerning the proposed Traveston Crossing dam site.

Two of the recent articles are attached for your perusal.

The first one is dated 9/2/07, concerning revelation that the dam siting was politically motivated.

This happened back in June 2006 and only now nine months later has there been any statement by QWI on these concerns after the media exposed the cover-up.

He said he was also concerned at revelations by a QWI spokeswoman that they had identified "mineral accumulation" on properties and that "the potential human health or environmental concern, is also considered low"

A 2006 GHD report commissioned by the Government to assess the Traveston Crossing Dam site identified that land contamination was an issue that could jeopardise the viability of the dam.
