Inquiry into Water Supplies for SE Queensland— Traveston Crossing Dam

Submission from Grafton District Anglers Club.

Firstly on behalf of the members of Grafton District Anglers Club (GDAC) I would like to thank the Committee for the invitation to appear at it's Public Hearing, and at the same time apologise for our inability to be there. As an amateur angling body the cost to our delegate and ourselves being the limiting factor.

We would however seek to present our views on the options put forward by SMEC, in relation to the Clarence and Mann Rivers.

With the proviso that certain criteria are met, we are not totally opposed to a dam on the Mann River, which would secure future water supplies to NE NSW, as well as SE Queensland. The emphasis being on potential supply to both regions.

Our criteria being that any impoundment must:

- 1-be capable of mitigation of catastrophic flood events,
- 2—be constructed in such a way as to allow for the simulation of minor freshes (floods), with a mixed low and normal temperature release,
- 3—have all its foreshores and waters open for public recreation,
- 4—be closed to commercial exploitation (fishing)
- 5—be constructed so that the continually maintained flow is not at the extreme cold normally experienced at the bottom of impounded water.
- 6—be located so that a minimum dislocation of private landowners and lessees occurs.

Our prime interest, being recreational fishing, necessitates the maintenance of "natural" river flow and temperature at all times.

We are totally opposed to any restriction at all on the Clarence River itself, but would not be averse to a structure on the Mann, provided it meets our stated criteria.
