

Australia's federal system of government is entering a historic phase of development. A new commitment to federal-state cooperation is unfolding. But what is needed to ensure that reforms are durable, and do not lapse back to the 'blame game' in a few years' time?

Will Canberra have to get tough – again – before progress is made on national priorities? Or can machinery be developed to lock in cooperation as a long-term approach? The Historic Venue

The conference and roundtable will be held in the Sir Henry Parkes School of Arts Museum, Tenterfield NSW. Built in the 1870s, this is the very building in which, on 24 October 1889, Parkes made the speech launching his successful campaign to bring together Australia's colonial leaders to forge a national federation. While historians differ on the significance of Parkes' role in federation overall, his 1889 Tenterfield Oration stands as a seminal moment in the long process of Australian nation building. The conference includes sessions and celebrations in the restored banquet room in which Parkes first spoke of the 'great commonwealth' to come.
